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INTRODUCTION

Welcome to Occident Bridge's Resume Answer Template Guide! In this guide, we will provide answer templates that you can use to respond to questions in English interviews.

We wrote this guide because many of our clients struggle to answer interview questions in a structured and logical manner. Many clients also tend to include unnecessary information that takes attention away from their skills or abilities.

As we have emphasized throughout our materials, English interviews are very **formulaic.** This means that they are like a formula. In one sense, this is good because there are not many questions that can surprise you. It also means that it is pretty straightforward to prepare for English interviews. You simply have to know what the interviewer expects you to say when they ask you a question.

At the same time, however, this also means that if you do not know what you should say or you don't know the structure to answer the question, this can be bad. The interviewer may think you are unprepared or unaware of what you should do in these cases, which can impact your ability to get a job offer.

That is where this guide can help. In this guide, we provide template answers to interview questions that you will commonly be asked in English interviews. We will give a brief introduction about what this question is asking you. Then we provide a sample answer, followed by a template and a detailed explanation of say in each part of the question. We then provide one or two additional answers for you to better understand the template and how it works.

The purpose of this guide is to give a more detailed explanation of how you should answer questions and what you can say when you're asked them. This is not meant to be a comprehensive guide to answer any kind of question, but instead it intends to provide a structure for you to follow.

HOW TO USE THIS GUIDE

Each question will have a brief introductory section that explains the question and what it is asking you. We then provide a sample answer that is separated by numbers. Our sample answer will look like this:

Thank you very much for inviting me to the interview today. (1) My name is Jane, and (2) I have been working as a data engineer at Company A for the past two years. In this role, I have been responsible for (3) developing and optimizing SQL databases, (4) automating ETL processes and integrating data from various sources, and (5) improving data security measures throughout the company.

Each number in the answer will correspond to an explanation below that explains a different part of the answer and what it is doing. So for the answer about, the explanations will look like this:

- 1) State your name
- 2) State your current position and the number of years you have been working in this role. You can also mention your company name, but this is not required.
- 3-5) List your major responsibilities. These responsibilities should align with what the job is looking for. You should look at the job advertisement carefully and consider what it requires and answer accordingly. Based on the sample answer, we can assume the job advertisement is looking for someone with experience developing

databases, automating ETL (extract, transform, load; a term unique to data engineering) processes, integrating data from different sources, and working on data security measures.

These explanations help you understand what you should say for each of these parts of the answer.

IMPORTANT NOTE: These numbers and this template should be used as a framework. You can be flexible with your answer and you do not need to memorize this framework directly. You should think of these frameworks as roadmaps rather than a solution. Thus, you will see some answers with slightly different wording. Remember, these numbers are meant to guide your answer to these questions rather than simply tell you exactly what to say for them.

Each answer will also include a template with some sample text and just the numbers. The purpose of this is so that you can see the structure of the answer without the text to try to make it easier for you to understand what to include and where. A template will look like this:

- Tell me about yourself
- Walk me through your resume
- Tell me about your work history
- Tell me about your background
- Tell us how you got to this point in your career

QUESTION OVERVIEW

It is very important to understand what this question is asking you. This question is asking you to explain your **work** background and your **professional** history. It is **not** asking you anything personal. A lot of our clients get confused by the wording of this question. However, this is most likely the first or second question you will be asked in the interview, and it is almost always asking you to summarize your work experiences and your work background.

Regardless of the form of the question, you need to give a short summary of your work experiences and your work background. You need to provide a brief summary of who you are professionally, how your past experiences have prepared you for the role that you are applying to, and what you are looking for in a role.

SAMPLE ANSWER

Thank you very much for inviting me to the interview today. (1) My name is Jane, and (2) I have been working as a data engineer at

Company A for the past two years. In this role, I have been responsible for (3) developing and optimizing SQL databases, (4) automating ETL processes and integrating data from various sources, and (5) improving data security measures throughout the company. (6) One of my biggest responsibilities in this role has been the development of a centralized data warehousing solution, which (7) is now used widely throughout various departments at the company. (8) This system has significantly improved data accessibility and reporting efficiency, enabling better decision-making across the company. Before working at Company A, (9) I worked as a data analyst at Company B. Here, I was responsible for (10) conducting statistical analysis to uncover trends and insights, (11) developing predictive models to support strategic planning, and (12) creating visualization dashboards that provided actionable intelligence to business stakeholders. I also have additional experience as a (13) database engineer and data expert for a small startup, where (14) I worked part-time during my senior year of university. I am interested in this role because (15) I am looking to continue working in data engineering but in a more managerial role. Specifically, (16) I am looking for a role that will allow me to apply my expertise and insights in data engineering in a way that allows me to translate my knowledge of data into actionable insights that impacts company decisions.

EXPLANATION

- 1) State your name.
- 2) State your current position and the number of years you have been working in this role. You can also mention your company name, but this is not required.
- 3-5) List your major responsibilities. These responsibilities should align with what the job is looking for. You should look at the job advertisement carefully and consider what it requires and answer accordingly. Based on the sample answer, we can assume the job advertisement is looking for someone with experience developing

databases, automating ETL (extract, transform, load; a term unique to data engineering) processes, integrating data from different sources, and working on data security measures.

- 6) State a major accomplishment, something you are proud of, or something impressive that you were able to achieve at your current position.
- 7) Provide more details about this accomplishment.
- 8) Explain the outcome of your accomplishment and what it helped to improve at your job or workplace.
- 9) After this, you can provide details about other relevant experiences. State any previous work experience that you had that may be relevant to the job that you are applying for.
- 10-12) Give more details about your responsibilities in this job. Again, like in 3-5, you want to make sure that these responsibilities are relevant to the job that you are applying for.
- 13-14) You can list any other tertiary relevant experience that might help the interviewers see why you are a good fit for this role.
- 15) Explain in a general way why you are interested in this role.
- 16) Explain in more detail what specifically attracts you about this role and what you hope working in this role will help you accomplish in your career.

ADDITIONAL ANSWER

Thank you very much for inviting me to the interview today. My name is (1) Jay, and I have been working as a language teacher at New York Local College for 7 years. In this role, I have been responsible for (2) instituting a new curriculum for English language courses, (3) developing original course content for students of diverse skill levels, and (4) contributing to the educational assessment of an English Composition minor at New York Local College. In particular, I have (5) extensive experience developing original curriculum materials using the latest pedagogical theories and concepts. For example, (6) I was recently responsible for leading the implementation of a new flipped learning curriculum for composition courses, which used AI, concepts from critical pedagogy, and the latest research in flipped classroom learning to redesign a more inclusive and relevant curriculum. (7) This has resulted in an increase in student engagement and an overall increase in student satisfaction with the course. Before working in these roles, (8) I worked as an English instructor at Tokyo Local University in Japan for four years, where I (9) taught EFL English classes, (10) business communication classes, and (11) grammar classes to university students. I also have experience in (12) student counseling and (13) conducting action research in my classrooms. These experiences have allowed me to develop a thorough understanding of curriculum development, language teaching methodologies, and effective classroom techniques for different learner populations. I am interested in this job because (14) I am intrigued by the chance to more directly shape curriculum contents of a brand new program. Specifically, (15) my experience developing new curriculums would be an asset to this role and would allow me to develop a robust curriculum based on a mix of practical and theoretical approaches.

TELL ME ABOUT YOUR STRENGTHS

FORMS OF THIS QUESTION

- What are your key strengths?
- What strengths do you bring to our team?
- What are your greatest strengths?
- Can you discuss one of your major assets and how it can benefit our team?
- What personal qualities do you think will help you to succeed?
- What do you consider your strongest skill?

QUESTION OVERVIEW

It is important to realize that this question is looking for your professional strengths as they relate to the job that you are applying for. They are **not** asking for your personal strengths. They are also asking you to mention **relevant** strengths. For example, if you are applying to an accounting job, you probably do not need presentation skills or debate skills. It would thus be better to emphasize something more directly related to accounting roles, such as bookkeeping for many different projects, managing different accounting projects, or quantitative skills.

Also, you generally should avoid answering these questions using more personal characteristics unless they are very relevant to the job. For example, some of our clients say that their strength is that they work really hard, that they are passionate, or that they speak a language very well. These answers are not very good because they are not directly related to the role. These are also answers that avoid actually providing a clear answer to this question, which could be seen negatively by

employers. You should always answer with a strength that is directly related to the job that you are applying to.

SAMPLE ANSWER

I would say my greatest strength is my (1) extensive experience in content marketing across various industries, which has (2) equipped me with a unique and adaptable skill set. (3) I have a wide range of experience from working as a social media content marketer for a 10-person startup to (4) my current managerial role as a senior content manager for a bank. These very different experiences have allowed me to (5) develop content marketing skills for diverse platforms ranging from (6) blog articles and social media posts to (7) comprehensive premium guides and instructional videos. In doing so, I have (8) also become competent in SEO best practices, (9) using analytical tools to track the impact of marketing campaigns, and (10) a range of qualitative and quantitative content marketing research techniques. In my (11) current managerial role, (12) I am also responsible for sharing my knowledge with others and performing quality control on the content they develop. These experiences have allowed me to develop (13) a strong understanding of content marketing on different platforms and the nuances of using different mediums to reach different audiences."

EXPLANATION

- 1) Explain your greatest strength in clear and direct terms.
- 2) Explain the result, impact, or effect of your strength in clear terms. Be sure to show **why** this strength is important or **what** the result has been.
- 3-4) Elaborate on your strength by providing more details. This can include things like why your strength is important, how your strength has impacted your work performance.

- 5-7) Explain what these experiences have allowed you to do and accomplish professionally.
- 8-10) (Optional/If necessary) If you can, feel free to explain more about what you have achieved or accomplished because of your strength. This is not absolutely necessary, but the more that you can explain your experiences the better.
- 11) Give more details about what this strength has enabled you to do using a specific example, perhaps from another job
- 12) Explain the direct impact of your strength at work processes at a given company.
- (13) Explain what these have allowed you to develop in general and why this is a strength.

ADDITIONAL ANSWER

I would say my greatest strength is (1) my ability to communicate complex technical ideas and concepts to non-technical audiences, which has enabled me to effectively bridge the gap between advanced scientific research and investor understanding. (2) This skill has proven crucial in securing funding and support for technological advancements in the pharmaceutical industry. (3) As a graduate student and postdoctoral fellow, I have been in constant contact with industry professionals and investors, which have required me to (4) explain complex scientific concepts into digestible information that appeals to a variety of stakeholders. In the process, (5) I have become competent in developing compelling pitch decks, (6) simplifying complicated research

findings, and (7) engaging diverse audiences effectively. For example, in my role as the Chief Scientific Officer for a 10-person biopharmaceutical startup startup, (8) I applied these skills daily by working closely with non-technical founders and staff to clarify the nuances of our pharmaceutical technology. (9) This collaboration was instrumental in securing over \$5 million in funding through clear, impactful communication. These experiences have allowed me to develop (13) communication skills that translate complex ideas and technologies into easily understandable terms, and I am very comfortable expressing technical knowledge using everyday language to diverse audiences.

ADDITIONAL ANSWER 2

My greatest strength is (1) my ability to conduct various types of usability research. (2) My background in academics and industry research has allowed me to develop a wide range of user research skills that allow me to develop, design, and execute research in a range of different research environments. (3) This wide range of expertise includes methods such as in-depth interviews, focus groups, contextual inquiry, participant observation, surveys, A/B testing, card sorts, and many others. (4) Moreover, my research experience ranges from a deep ethnographic study of a small fishing community to a massive interview and focus group-based study of 1000 ride-share app users that aimed to understand changes in user behavior in different market segments. (5) These very different research contexts have allowed me to excel using a variety of skills and methods, and (6) I am competent and I can handle the challenges of any research context. (11) In my current role, I recently completed a nine-month long qualitative research project on the usability of a new software tool for analyzing financial data at a bank. (12) Our study uncovered six reasons why the software failed to deliver its expected value and recommended three major improvements the bank could make to the software to enhance its usability. In addition, (8) I have also become competent at

communicating research findings to diverse stakeholders and (9) staking up on the latest research technologies through active participation in professional trade conferences. (13) Overall, these experiences have allowed me to develop a diverse usability skill set that allows me to perform a wide range of research functions and excel in ambiguous and complex research environments.

TELL ME ABOUT YOUR WEAKNESSES

FORMS OF THIS QUESTION

- What areas do you feel you can improve on professionally?
- Where are some of your weak points related to this role?
- What areas are you needing some improvement on?
- What are some weaknesses you need to work on?

WHY DO YOU WANT THIS JOB?

FORMS OF THIS QUESTION

- How does this role align with your career goals?
- Why do you think you're a good fit for this position?
- Why are you interested in this specific role?
- What drew you to this company and this role?

QUESTION OVERVIEW

This question is asking you to explain the **professional reasons** you want the job you are applying for. It is very important to recognize that the emphasis here is on **professional** reasons rather than personal reasons. Many Occident Bridge clients fail to recognize this and instead

of offering a professional reason, they say something like "Company A is an amazing company in the consulting industry" or "My current workplace environment is not good and my boss is toxic to work with." While these are valid reasons for wanting a new job, you should keep the focus of this answer on **professional** reasons.

Acceptable professional reasons for wanting to change jobs include things like career growth, professional development, skills acquisition, or something else that focuses on your growth and advancement in your career.

SAMPLE ANSWER

Right now I am looking for a (1) role that will allow me to apply my product management experience to a more regional level. Specifically, I am (2) looking for a position that will allow me to engage with the wider European market rather than just working with the Irish market. Since (3) my local management projects have had a YOY positive return of over 15%, (4) I feel like I am ready and capable of taking on broader projects. My ultimate career goal is (5) to become a global director, and (6) taking on more responsibility managing projects in a regional market like Europe would be the next most logical step in my career. Working as a (7) regional manager on projects that expand across Europe will (8) allow me to take my project management skills to a higher level by learning how to work with different teams in different countries and to apply my current skills more internationally. Moreover, (9) my ability to communicate and liaise across different teams like sales, marketing, and tech among others, will allow me to easily integrate into this role. Lastly, I have (10) long admired Company A and the way that your company values results-driven project management and the way that company management is willing to change directions if something is not working.

EXPLANATION

- 1) Be very clear and explicit about why you want to join this company and what you want to get out of this role. Many clients struggle to state a professional reason why they want this role. It is okay to be honest and direct here. Don't say something that praises the company here. Instead, explain very clearly and directly what you want to achieve by joining this company professionally or in terms of your career development.
- 2) Give more details about what you hope to do in this role. You can say something like what you want to learn, the kinds of people you want to work with, the industries in which you want to gain experience, or anything related to what you will do or learn by taking this job. 3/4) These are cause and effect. Since (3), therefore (4). With 3 you should explain your accomplishments or give another reason why you feel that you have reached the maximum potential growth at your current role or company. With 4 you should explain that you are seeking more improvement and that you want a role that will allow you to learn things or gain experiences that you are unable to gain in your current role.
- 5) It may help to reiterate your ultimate career goal here and explain how working in the job you are interviewing for will help you get closer to that goal.
- 6) Emphasize how specifically this job will help you get closer towards your current career goal.
- 7) Reiterate the position here.
- 8) Give even more details of the stuff that you want to do, learn, or accomplish in this role to emphasize that point that you are certain this job can be the next step in your career progression.
- 9) Reiterate or explain more reasons why you would excel in this role and how your background has prepared you to succeed in this role if you are offered it
- 10) (Optional) Express admiration for the company and things that they do well or are known for. Do not exaggerate your praise for the company or go overboard, but it is acceptable to express that you admire something the company does well and that you want to be a part of a company that works in such a way.

ADDITIONAL ANSWER

Right now I am looking for a (1) teaching role that allows me to work more closely with students. Specifically, I am (2) looking for a position that will allow me to teach smaller classes so that I can give students a more personalized learning experience and work with students to give advice on college admissions and their possible career paths. (3) Since I enjoyed working as an admissions advisor and high school counselor in my previous job, (4) I am looking for another chance to join a tight-knight high school community that takes education and personal growth seriously. In the future, (5) I hope to become a principal of a small private high school just like This School, and (6) taking on a role that requires teaching intensive small classes, working closely with students to prepare college applications, and having a strong extracurricular presence in the school community will help me get closer to this goal. (7) Working as an educator here will (8) allow me to get back into smaller classrooms and help me to gain the personal experience working with students that I simply cannot accomplish in my current role of teaching class sizes of 25-40 students. Moreover, (9) my extensive teaching background and previous experience counseling students on prospective colleges, which I taught in my College Admissions Prep course taught at Previous School, will allow me to easily transition into this role without much difficulty. Lastly, I have (10) always admired the way This School values its students and community engagement, and I would love to be a part of such a community.

TELL ME ABOUT A TIME WHEN YOU FACED A CHALLENGE AT WORK

FORMS OF THIS QUESTION

- Can you share an example of when you handled a difficult situation in the workplace?
- Describe a challenging project and how you managed it?
- Tell me about a time when you faced a challenge and how you overcame this.
- Tell us about a time when you overcame something difficult at work.
- What was the last challenge you faced at work and how did you solve it?

QUESTION OVERVIEW

This question is looking to see if you can deal with pressure in your workplace. It is looking to see that you are aware of ways to handle pressure if you encounter it and also that you are prepared enough to overcome pressure if you find yourself in a difficult situation. It is also looking to see if you are willing to take jobs that involve challenging situations or whether you are someone who avoids them. An answer such as "I do not encounter any challenging situations at my work" will not be received well.

An ideal answer to this question should describe something that is relevant to the job you have done or are applying to and focus on what **you learned** from facing this challenge. It is crucial that you show how you grew or improved as a worker from encountering this experience.

Thus, the template and answers below all emphasize professional growth from challenges.

SAMPLE ANSWER

One of the most significant challenges I faced at work occurred (1) shortly after I was hired as a (2) equity researcher at Company A. (3) I was assigned a project that required in-depth analysis of the healthcare sector, which I was not familiar with. The task (4) involved evaluating financial statements and market trends of a very niche part of the healthcare sector to provide actionable investment recommendations, and I quickly realized I was out of my depth. (5) I had done similar work in the agricultural sector, but upon investigating this specific niche in the healthcare sector, I realized this industry was much more complex than agriculture.

Instead of panicking, (6) I tried to approach the challenge in a structured way. First, (7) I dedicated extra hours outside of work to study this niche sector thoroughly. (8) I read industry reports, followed market news, and completed online courses to build a solid foundation of knowledge. (9) I also reached out to a former classmate that works in a related field to get their advice on how I could approach this. This helped me (10) understand the basics and feel more confident about the task at hand.

I also knew that (11) relying solely on self-study wouldn't be enough. (12) I made a point to communicate openly with my colleagues and supervisors. (13) I reached out to experienced team members for guidance, (14) asking specific questions about their approach to similar analyses. (15) Their insights were really informative and helped me to validate and repudiate some of the things I learned on my own. They were also supportive and helped me to feel like I didn't have to address this entirely on my own.

I also (16) maintained regular communication with my boss. I was honest about my initial unfamiliarity with the sector but assured her of my commitment to providing strong recommendations. (17) I provided her frequent updates on my progress and was open to her feedback. (18) Her insights combined with those of my colleagues were tremendous in helping me navigate some of the challenges working in this particular sector.

Through (19) a combination of personal study, reaching out to my colleagues and network, and communicating efficiently with my boss, (20) I was able to recommend three companies to invest in. (21) These three companies were all among the top 15% of performing companies in the niche, and my boss was so impressed by my report and recommendations that she asked if I would work on this sector permanently. This experience (22) reinforced the value of approaching problems systematically and methodologically, the importance of continuous learning, and the value of strong and effective communication.

- 4) Give more specific details about why this was a challenge for you. What made this task challenging? What problems did you face when trying to address this challenge or perform your job?
- 5) Explain why this was a challenge. Common answers here include that you were assigned to work on something new, that something happened that was unexpected, that your initial plans were incorrect or inaccurate, or something like this. Some clients worry that this will make them sound like an unprepared worker. However, this question is also focused on your growth. As long as you emphasize what you learned from this experience, explaining why this was a challenge will not hurt you.
- 6) Explain how you started to address this problem. How did you approach it? What were you thinking when it arose?
- 7) Give the first thing that you did to try to approach this issue.
- 8-9) Give further details about what you did and elaborate on what you mentioned in (7).
- 10) Explain what the actions in 7-9 helped you to accomplish. How did it help you to address the issue that you were facing and the challenge you were encountering?
- 11-12) Explain more about what you did to solve this problem. As in the example, this can be presented as a "I knew A, so B" type of structure. For example, "I knew this initial research would not be enough, so I contacted several firms specializing in this technology to get more help." "I knew that this would not be enough to ensure that my students understood this abstract concept, so I started to consult our e-library resources and YouTube to try to find more engaging content that might reinforce students' understanding of this theory."

13-14 (optional) Provide more details that explained how you were able to effectively approach this problem.

15 Explain the result of your efforts from points 11-14. What did this second step of addressing the problem help you to achieve? How did it help you to ultimately solve the challenge you were facing?

16 (optional) Add a third step you took to try to solve this problem.

17 Elaborate further by providing more details about what you did in (16)18 Explain the ultimate results from 16-17 and show how these further helped you to solve the problem you were facing.

19-20 Here you can tie your answer together by using a cause and effect structure. "Through A, B resulted." "Through my hard work and continued

21) Here, you can give more information about the results and the outcome of how you approached this challenge. This doesn't necessarily have to be something positive, but it should be focused on the outcome and what you learned from this.

22) End your answer by stating what you learned from facing this challenge and how it helped you to grow as a worker.

ADDITIONAL ANSWER

One of the most significant challenges I faced at work occurred (1) while I was working as a user researcher (2) at Previous Company A. (3) We were tasked with gathering in-depth user insights for a new feature we were developing. (4) While conducting user interviews, I realized that some participants were inadvertently sharing sensitive personal information that was not relevant to the study. (5) This posed a potential ethical issue regarding privacy and data protection.

To address this challenge, (6) I took several steps. (7) Firstly, I paused the interviews and reviewed our consent process. (8) I ensured that participants were fully aware of the scope of our research and the type of information we were collecting. (9) I updated our consent forms to

explicitly state that participants should avoid sharing sensitive personal information and provided clear guidelines on the types of data we were interested in. (10) This helped to ensure that participants would be fully aware of the sensitivity of the data collection moving forward.

Next, (11) I communicated with my team and supervisors about the issue. (12) I explained the ethical concerns and proposed a plan to address them. (13) We collectively decided to implement additional training for our research team on handling sensitive information and (14) ethical interviewing techniques. (15) This training emphasized the importance of steering conversations back to relevant topics and how to handle sensitive disclosures appropriately.

On top of that, (16) I reached out to a mentor with experience in UX research ethics to seek their advice. (17) They provided valuable insights and reassured me that taking proactive steps to protect participant privacy was the right approach. (18) They also gave me some recommendations to minimize the potential occurrence of ethical issues in this study and in future ones.

Through (19) pausing the study, revising the consent forms, and communicating with the relevant parties, (20) I was able to resume the research with a clear conscience, knowing that we had taken the necessary precautions to protect our participants. (21) The revised consent process and team training improved the quality and integrity of our research, and in the end we were able to offer our stakeholders six recommendations on how the usability of their products could be improved. (22) This experience taught me the importance of maintaining high ethical standards in research. It reinforced the need for clear communication, both with research participants and within the team, and highlighted the value of seeking advice when faced with complex challenges. By prioritizing ethics, we were able to conduct our research responsibly and maintain the trust of our participants.

TELL ME ABOUT A TIME WHEN HAD A CONFLICT WITH A TEAM MEMBER AT WORK AND HOW IT WAS RESOLVED

FORMS OF THIS QUESTION

- Tell me about a time when you had a conflict at work?
- How do you manage conflicts when working with others?
- Describe a situation where you had a disagreement with a coworker.
- How do you handle conflicts with your colleagues?
- Can you give me an example of a time when you had a strong disagreement at work and how you handled it?
- Can you describe a time when you had to deal with a difficult coworker?

QUESTION OVERVIEW

This question is looking for three things. First, it is looking to see that you are **self-aware** enough to know how to answer this question. Everyone has conflicts with their colleagues, whether they are big or small. This question wants to see that you are honest about the conflicts that you might have experienced.

Second, it is looking to get more about the **nature of the conflicts** that you experienced. Specifically, it is asking you to describe the context and essence of these conflicts. Thus, the conflict that you mention should be one that is relevant and professional. It should not be one that involves nitpicking or fussing. For example, one of clients once said that they had a conflict because they refused to yield to their colleagues' preference for using a certain color on a product. Since our client's perception that their color choice was superior to their

colleague's was not supported by data, we told them to not use this. While it is great our client stood up for themselves, contributing to a major conflict over a minor detail is not good.

Lastly, this question is looking to see how you **respond** to conflicts. Nobody wants to work with a colleague who argues or is very confrontational. Likewise, nobody wants to work with someone who cannot handle the pressure of a conflict and just gives in.

Accordingly, your answer to this question should be appropriate to your job and demonstrate your ability to handle conflicts in a professional manner.

SAMPLE ANSWER

One of the most challenging conflicts I faced at work occurred (1) while I was working as an analyst at my former company. (2) My manager, who was known for being quite controlling, had conducted an analysis on a project we were working on. (3) Upon reviewing his work, I noticed significant discrepancies in the data that could lead to erroneous conclusions that could have cost our company financially. (4) Initially, I was hesitant to bring up my concerns, knowing his tendency to be defensive about his work. However, I understood the importance of (5) accuracy and felt it was my responsibility to address the issue. I decided to approach the situation carefully and professionally.

To address this, (6) I scheduled a one-on-one meeting with my manager to discuss my findings. (7) I expected him to be confrontational and defensive about his analysis, so I prepared my own personal data to present to him. My plan was (8) to be respectful and collaborative but also assertive in my reasoning. I started by (9) acknowledging his expertise and the effort he had put into the analysis. Then, (10) I presented my data and explained the discrepancies I had found, backing my points with clear evidence and alternative calculations.

Although (11) my manager was defensive and confrontational as expected, (12) by maintaining a respectful and cooperative approach, (13) I was able to shift the conversation from a confrontation to a joint problem-solving session. (14) As we worked through the data, my boss began to see the validity of my points. Together, we identified the errors and corrected the analysis.

In the end, (15) our project was successful and we avoided making any financial errors. (16) My manager appreciated my diligence and willingness to address the issue constructively, and surprisingly even praised my honesty and integrity. (17) This conflict ultimately strengthened our professional relationship and improved our team's overall performance.

This experience taught me (18) to approach conflicts with empathy and respect, even when you strongly disagree with someone. It also taught me (19) the importance of being prepared and remaining assertive during conflicts. Additionally, it (20) highlighted the importance of effective communication and maintaining a collaborative attitude even during tense situations.

EXPLANATION

- 1) Explain where the conflict happened. You may not want to reveal too much specific information about the people or companies involved, so it is sufficient to say something like "In my previous role."
- 2-4) All of these provide background about the context. There really isn't a set template for these since these are always going to be different depending on your conflict.
- 5) After providing details about the background of the conflict, you should explain why you felt the conflict was necessary. Why could you not overlook this conflict? Why was it necessary to cause or intensify a conflict at your workplace? In the same answer, the interviewee mentions the importance of accuracy and the possibility of financial losses, which are excellent reasons for potentially causing a conflict at work.
- 6) Explain the specific actions that you took to address the conflict professionally. It is usually better to deal with a conflict in a private meeting or somewhere that might involve multiple people, where the conflict might be intensified.
- 7) You can give more details about the background or nature of the conflict or what you expected would happen.
- 8) Explain your general strategy for resolving the conflict or addressing this issue.
- 9-10) Explain what you did during the conflict in order. These should be logically sequenced, and you should be sure not to leave out any important details. Something like: "First, I did (A). Then, I told my boss (B) and presented (C). Lastly, (D)."
- 11) Explain how the other party responded to the conflict (which is often not in a constructive way at first)
- 12) Describe how you were able to counter their negative behavior and how you persisted to engage the other person in a constructive way.
- 13) Explain the result of your efforts in a way that demonstrates your professionalism. Stay focused on your own actions and how you tried to make sure they led to a positive outcome.

- 14) Here, you can elaborate more on the process and describe how you worked to overcome issues that arose from this conflict.
- 15) Now state the final result of the conflict.
- 16) Explain one positive result from your effort to address this conflict.
- 17) Provide details about what happened between you and the other party after this conflict or how this conflict helped your team to grow. By showing that your participation in this conflict had a positive result, you demonstrate that you are a person who engages in constructive conflicts that try to improve processes and efficiency. This also shows that you are emphatically not like our client who engaged in a seemingly trivial conflict over a color choice.

18-20) All of these describe what you learned as a result of engaging in the conflict. You should always conclude your answer to this question by focusing on how this conflict made you a better professional and how it will enable you to cope with similar situations in the future (if you encounter them).

ADDITIONAL ANSWER

One of the most challenging conflicts I faced at work occurred (1) when I was on an event planning committee in one of my previous roles. (2) We were organizing a major company-wide event, and one of the committee members, Alex, was particularly confrontational and frequently doubted the ideas and contributions of another member, Sarah. (3) This tension was causing delays in our planning process and was affecting the overall morale of the team. (4) Initially, I tried to stay neutral, but it became clear that the conflict was hindering our progress. I understood the importance of (5) fostering a collaborative environment and felt it was necessary to address the issue to ensure the success of our event.

To address this, (6) I proposed a special meeting with the committee to discuss the conflict openly and professionally. (7) I anticipated that Alex

might be defensive and that the discussion could become heated, so I prepared by setting ground rules for respectful communication and ensuring that we had a neutral facilitator. My plan was (8) to mediate the discussion, allowing both Alex and Sarah to express their perspectives without interruption. I started by (9) acknowledging the hard work and dedication of both members and the value of diverse viewpoints. (14) As we delved deeper into the issues, Alex began to recognize the validity of Sarah's contributions, and Sarah appreciated the opportunity to explain her ideas more thoroughly.

In the end, (15) we were able to reach a consensus on several key decisions, and the planning process became much smoother and more efficient. (16) The open dialogue not only resolved the immediate conflict but also improved the overall dynamics and communication within the committee. (17) This conflict resolution ultimately led to a successful event and strengthened the professional relationships among all committee members.

WE NOTICED YOU DO NOT HAVE MUCH EXPERIENCE IN (...). WHAT MAKES YOU QUALIFIED FOR THIS ROLE?

FORMS OF THIS QUESTION

- How does your previous experience prepare you for this role?
- What skills do you have that make you a good fit for this position, despite your lack of direct experience?
- Why should we hire you over candidates with more experience in this field?
- How will you compensate for your lack of experience in this area?
- What makes you confident you can succeed in this role without much prior experience?

QUESTION OVERVIEW

This is a question that everyone should be prepared for. However, it is especially common for people transitioning into a new field or role and for people who lack direct experience. There is no ambiguity about what this question is asking: it is asking you to explain why you are a good fit for the role you applied to despite your obvious lack of experience. While this can seem like an aggressive question that is meant to confuse you, it is actually an excellent chance for you to demonstrate your skills, passions, and credentials.

The answer to this question is going to be incredibly personal. This makes providing a strong template difficult. The important thing is to highlight your professional and non-professional experiences that are somehow related to the role you are applying to that helps make you suitable for the position.

SAMPLE ANSWER

Definitely. I would love the chance to elaborate on this! I understand that my background is in (1) sales and my lack of direct experience in (2) software development can raise eyebrows. However, I have compensated for this lack of direct experience in several ways.

First, (3) I have spent the past two years studying frontend development and have volunteered with several local small businesses to help them manage their company websites. (4) I have been able to apply my classroom experience learning React, JavaScript, and Tailwind by rebuilding two company websites and collaborating with company owners to develop a site with an intuitive and user-friendly design. (5) These sites are the first two websites featured in my portfolio.

Second, (6) I expected that my lack of direct experience might be a problem, so I have also informally volunteered to work with the development team within my current company. (7) I have earned their trust, and they have since outsourced some of their frontend development tasks to me, such as building out some React components and refactoring some legacy code to work with more modern frameworks. (8) In doing this, I have been able to closely work with senior developers, and I have been able to shadow them throughout their work. This has been an incredibly useful experience, and after doing this for (9) seven months, I am (10) now fully aware of what is expected of frontend developers.

Third, (11) I have worked on a number of projects, which are featured on my GitHub. (12) These even include a small group project where we built a music player application, where I (13) was responsible for building the entire frontend design and implementation using Vue.

All of these experiences have given me (14) hands-on experience in coding, debugging, and software design. I am now confident I can handle a wide range of (15) frontend software development issues.

Lastly, I am passionate about (16) technology and continuous learning. This passion has driven me to (17) stay updated with the latest industry trends and continuously improve my technical skills. I am confident that (18) my dedication and willingness to learn will enable me to quickly adapt and excel in this new field.

So, although I lack formal (19) training/experience as a (20) software developer, I am confident that my experiences have prepared me to excel in this role if I am offered the position.

- 1) Mention your background. Notice how the template begins with a very enthusiastic phrase: "Definitely. I would love the chance to elaborate on this!" Starting with a somewhat excited tone for this answer can be seen positively because it gives the impression that you are aware of your lack of direct experience and that you are happy about the chance to speak about how you have compensated for it. This can give a strong impression that you are passionate about the role you want to transition into.
- 2) Mention the field where you lack experience.
- 3-4) Explain the first way that you have compensated for your lack of experience in the role.
- 5) If you have something to show from points 3-4, either materially or in terms of an accomplishment, mention it or highlight it here. If it is something that you can show, mention that it is in your portfolio, on your website, or wherever it can be found.
- 6-8) Explain the second way that you have made up for your lack of direct experience.
- 9) State how long you have been working to compensate for your lack of experience.
- 10) State what you are now capable of doing because of your efforts to make up for your lack of direct experience in the role.

- 11) Provide more reasons why you are a good fit for the role despite your lack of formal training.
- 12-13) Provide more details about this third point. You can use a cause-result structure here. For example, "I even worked on a large project, where I was responsible for all of the UX and UI design elements." Or something like this: "I developed an entire software trading system, which came to be used widely throughout the firm's finance department."
- 14) Explain what all of these experiences have provided you that enables you to perform the job despite your lack of formal education in this field.
- 15) Restate the scope of the abilities that you will perform in the job you are applying to.
- 16) Express your passion for this field and how enthusiastic you are about the chance to work in this field and to continue learning about it.
- 17) Explain what this passion has led you to do and how it has led you to continue learning and pursuing the things you are interested in.
- 18) Provide a short statement that you are confident in your own abilities to perform this job well. This is your chance to make a strong statement expressing your confidence and level of comfort doing the job.
- 19) Here, insert the word most relevant to your situation. If you don't have any experience, you would say "experience". If you don't have any formal training (a degree, certificate, etc.), you can say "training" or "education." Use the word that is most relevant to your circumstances. 20) Restate the job you are applying to.

ADDITIONAL ANSWER

Absolutely. I would love to talk about this! I understand that my background is in (1) more concentrated in academic research and my

lack of experience in (2) industry research might raise eyebrows. However, I have compensated for this lack of direct experience in the following ways.

First, (3) I have worked part-time on several industry projects that have allowed me to gain hands-on experience in industry labs. (4) Last summer, before I began my postdoc, I interned full-time at Company A, where I worked to help their lab scientists perform tests on a new drug they were developing. (5) This experience allowed me to learn what it is like to work in a fast-paced industry lab, with people from different backgrounds and departments. This has been an incredibly useful experience, and after doing this for (9) four months, I am (10) now very comfortable working in fast-paced and high-pressure lab settings.

NOTICE: (9) and (10) can be moved to where they are needed. Remember, these templates are flexible.

Second, (6) throughout my PhD and postdoc research, I have deliberately focused on research projects that are highly practical and application-oriented, which has set them apart from the more theoretical projects conducted in similar departments. (7) In particular, my doctoral research was specifically aimed at improving the efficiency of photovoltaic cells so that industry companies could make use of my research later on. (8) My postdoc project similarly aimed to develop advanced energy storage systems, ensuring that the innovations could be readily adopted by industry for enhanced performance and sustainability.

All of these experiences have given me (14) in-depth experience working on practical industry-oriented projects that have real-world implications. I am now confident I can handle a wide range of (15) industry work-environments and that I will be readily able to adapt to industry lab research.

NOTICE: Again, these templates can be flexible. Here, we skipped the third point about why the applicant is prepared for the job. This is completely acceptable.

Lastly, I am passionate about (16) sustainable energy solutions. This passion has driven me to (17) pursue extensive research and practical applications in renewable energy technologies. I am confident that (18) my dedication to this field, combined with my applied research experience, will allow me to contribute significantly to your team.

So, although I lack formal (19) industry experience as a (20) renewable energy engineer, I am confident that my experiences have prepared me to excel in this role if I am offered the position.

WE NOTICED YOU HAVE A 2 YEAR GAP IN YOUR RESUME. CAN YOU EXPLAIN THIS?

FORMS OF THIS QUESTION

- Tell me about a time when you had a conflict at work?
- How do you manage conflicts when working with others?
- Describe a situation where you had a disagreement with a coworker.
- How do you handle conflicts with your colleagues?
- Can you give me an example of a time when you had a strong disagreement at work and how you handled it?
- Can you describe a time when you had to deal with a difficult coworker?

QUESTION OVERVIEW

This question is asking you to explain a gap in your work history. People have gaps in their work history for various reasons. Some people have personal problems, some people are unable to find jobs in a tough job market, some people have health problems, and some people just need a break from working. Although these gaps are becoming more common, and thus companies are less likely to be concerned about such a gap, some companies will still ask about them and interviewers may want to know why there is a gap like this.

If you have such a gap, the most important thing to emphasize is that although you have not been formally employed, you have remained interested and active in the field of work you are applying to. You need to show that you are still aware of the trends in the industry that you are applying to and that you are not years behind because you took a break. Thus, the main thing you need to do here is to show that the gap will not seriously affect your ability to perform your job and you will not need extra support because of this gap.

SAMPLE ANSWER

Sure, (1) I would be happy to. During the gap in my resume, I (2) dedicated time to caring for two separate family members. (3) My mother was hospitalized, and I needed to help my sister take care of her newborn child. (4) I knew this would impact my career, but I felt this was the right decision due to the family obligations at the time.

Although I was not formally employed during this period, I (5) remained committed to staying current in the field of software development. (6) I also took this time to learn some new programming languages and technologies that I had always wanted to learn. (7) For example, I took online courses in lower level languages such as C++ and learned more

about networking, which I had previously neglected. (8) I also went through some advanced JavaScript courses that helped me to improve my skills using Node and metaframeworks such as Next, which I did not have many opportunities to pursue in my previous job.

Additionally, I (9) spent time building out several projects and contributing to some open source projects on my own during this time. (10) I posted all of these on my online portfolio, but (11) the one I am most proud of is my full-stack web application for real-time data analytics. (12) This project involved using React for the frontend, Node.js and Express for the backend, and integrating with a NoSQL database. It also included real-time data visualization using D3.js, showcasing my ability to handle both frontend and backend development and work with complex data sets.

These activities (13) allowed me to stay active in the field and continue developing my skills despite being formally employed. I am confident that (14) despite my gap, I am able to handle whatever issues come up in my job, and if I encounter any tasks that I am less familiar with (15) I will be able to approach them systematically and get caught up to using them quickly.

TEMPLATE

EXPLANATION

- 1) Just like in the previous question asking about the lack of formal experience, when answering this question take a somewhat proactive and enthusiastic attitude and use a phrase like "I am happy to" or "I'd love to." It shows that you are excited about the chance to address and you are confident that you will make a better impression once you explain your gap.
- 2-4) (Optional) This section is optional. 2-4 explain the gap and why it exists. Remember: **You are not obliged to reveal any information that you do not want to!** You do not need to elaborate on this in much detail. You can simply say "I have this gap for personal reasons." However, having a sincere explanation for your gap, whatever the reason may be, can help explain the gap. It can also justify the gap entirely in many cases and make your answer to this question more convincing.
- 5-6) Here, you should explain the first way that you have compensated for your lack of work experience during the two years. This should be the general way that you compensated for this lack of experience (you will mention more specific ways you have tried to compensate in 7-8 below). You can discuss things such as taking courses, working on personal projects, or reading trade publications and staying up on industry news and events. What you say here will be relative to what your industry is and how you have tried to compensate for the gap on your resume.
- 7-8) For 7-8, you should go into more specific details about what you did to compensate for the gap. What you discuss in 7-8 should be more specific than what you mention in 5-6.
- 9) Mention the second thing you have done to compensate for your lack of work experience during the gap years on your resume. You should have at least two things you have done to make up for this gap. 10-12) Like in 7-8, here you should provide more details about what you did to compensate for this gap using specific examples. In the sample

answer, the interviewee discusses learning specific computer language frameworks and database skills that they were curious about. Whatever specific details you mention should be related to the job that you are applying for.

- 13) State how the continued learning that you have done during the gap years and how it will help you in your future role.
- 14) Explain that you are confident in your ability to do the job well and how you don't believe the gap will affect your ability to do your job well.
 15) (Optional) It can be good to explain what you will do if you encounter a situation in your job that you are unfamiliar with. In this case, you want to emphasize that if you encounter a situation that you are not familiar with, you will be able to handle it and solve the problem

on your own without affecting your team's workflow.

ADDITIONAL ANSWER

Sure, (1) I would love the chance to explain that gap. During the gap in my resume, I (2) needed a break from teaching, as (3) I became completely burnt out during the stresses of teaching during COVID combined with a stressful and somewhat unsupportive work environment. (4) This whole situation made me question whether I really wanted to dedicate my life to teaching, and this break helped me to reconsider whether teaching was for me.

Although I was not formally employed during this period, I (5) used this time off to explore different areas of teaching in greater depth and to volunteer in various local organizations to explore different types of teaching. (6) First, I took several short-term teaching certification courses online and at local colleges. (7) These courses included teaching students with disabilities, teaching English as a second language, and even student counseling courses. (8) Taking these courses allowed me to explore different theories and concepts in areas of teaching that I

lacked experience in and as a result I got to learn more about these areas of teaching and satisfied my curiosity.

Additionally, and most excitingly, (9) I was able to get some hands on experience applying the knowledge learned in these courses by volunteering to teach courses in these subjects at local schools and organizations. (10) My local community college allowed me to teach two ESL courses to high school aged and adult learners as a volunteer. (11) This experience was incredibly satisfying, as I had complete freedom to develop course contents based on the school's curriculum, and was able to teach the classes applying the theories I learned during the certification course. (12) I also volunteered to teach one class to students with disabilities at one of the local charities, which was also an interesting experience.

These activities (13) have allowed me to rediscover my passion for teaching and to also obtain a more nuanced understanding of the kind of teaching that I want to be doing. Moreover, it has allowed me to see that I am passionate about teaching English to adult learners, which is why I am applying to this job as an ESL teacher. I am confident (14) that my past teaching experience and certification course has prepared me to excel in the ESL teaching job at your school. If I encounter any issues that I am less familiar with (15) I am confident that I can reach out for help from the appropriate sources at the school and elsewhere to solve such issues promptly. And lastly, I intend to further my knowledge of ESL teaching by enrolling in a part-time masters course at Local School, where I plan to obtain my masters degree in Teaching English as a Second Language in three years.

WHERE DO YOU SEE YOURSELF IN FIVE YEARS?

FORMS OF THIS QUESTION

- What are your long-term career goals?
- Where do you see yourself working in the future?
- What do you see yourself doing in the future?
- What do you hope to achieve in the next # years?
- What are your aspirations for the next part of your career?
- What is your vision for your career path?
- What kind of job do you see yourself doing in the future?

QUESTION OVERVIEW

This question is asking you to elaborate on your long-term career goals. It is similar to the "Why do you want this job?" question that we discussed earlier, but this question is more focused on your long-term development. This question can be tricky if you are not familiar with what to say, so we wanted to include a template in this guide.

The most important thing to remember when answering this question is that you want to focus on how the job that you are interviewing for will help you to achieve your long-term career goals. You also need to show how this job will help you to achieve the goals and how you plan to use this role as a stepping stone to get to where you want to be.

In addition, you also need to show that you will be dedicated to this company and that you would be interested in staying with this company over the course of your career. Even if you do plan to leave this company after you have gained a certain amount of experience or achievements, you need to still frame your answer by stating that you want to be with this company and grow with them. Nobody will hire you

if you say something like "I will use this job as a stepping stone to get experience and then I want to move to a more prestigious company." Therefore, another important thing you need to do here is show that you are willing to grow with the company.

SAMPLE ANSWER

In five years, I see myself (1) having made significant strides in my career as a project manager and hopefully becoming a regional project manager within a large organization. By that time, I hope to have (2) gained extensive experience leading domestic projects that deliver results to stakeholders so that I can proceed to apply this on a larger scale. One of my key goals is (3) to advance into a senior project management role. Specifically, I aim to (4) take on larger, more complex projects that challenge my skills and allow me to make a more substantial impact on the organization. I also see myself (5) mentoring junior project managers, sharing my knowledge and experience to help them grow in their careers.

To achieve this, besides obtaining a role that offers me more responsibilities as a (6) project manager, I plan to (7) continue enhancing my project management skills through continuous learning and professional development. (8) I intend to pursue advanced certifications such as the PMP (Project Management Professional) and Agile Certified Practitioner (ACP) to stay current with best practices and methodologies in the field. (9) Additionally, I want to deepen my understanding of emerging project management tools and technologies to ensure that I can leverage them effectively to optimize project outcomes.

Furthermore, I aspire to (10) contribute to the strategic planning and decision-making processes within the organization. (11) I believe that my on-the-ground project experience can provide valuable insights into

how we can improve our operations and align our projects more closely with business goals.
